
STUDENTS SAY... IN A NEW POLL, STUDENTS REVEAL MIXED OPINIONS ON ADVISORY

It's out with the old, and in with the new in middle school. This year, Holy Family Catholic School has introduced the new Advisory system. Advisories consist of about 15 students each from 6th, 7th, and 8th grade, who gather with their advisory teacher during a period of the day for lessons in study skills and digital literacy, team building activities, bonding time, and other projects. So far, the new system is flowing well, but some students have suggestions to make them better. A poll of 80 middle school students revealed mixed opinions about the new system. The library is OPEN! Dr. Kahn and Ms. Youngpeter have been hard at work to attract more and more students to the library, and turn more students into book lovers! To kick off the year, here are 3 special things the library is doing to make reading more interesting for everyone.

LECTIO is a reading program that encourages everyone who participates to read 20 diverse books over the year. For every 5 books read, students receive a prize! At 5 books, students get the opportunity to vote for their favorite book and recognition at mass. With 10 books, they get a certificate. At 15 books, they are invited to a party with all the other 15 book readers. Finally, at 20 books, students are awarded a medal! What if they want to vote for their favorite book AND go to the party? Don't worry because the prizes are cumulative (that means the students get the rewards as they reach each goal).

But even without the reward, LECTIO is a fun program, and the books are carefully selected for students in fourth through eighth grade. This year (so far) 65 students are participating in LECTIO. You won't get bored with these books. A Lectio participant Hannah Blair says "My favorite book so far is The Mona Lisa Vanishes by Nicholas Day, a story about the history of how the Mona Lisa rose to fame and who stole it." -Oops, you'll have to read The Mona Lisa Vanishes to find out!

While LECTIO has been around for 9 years, something entirely new and exciting has started this year, the Library Printing House! The project is run by Dr. Kahn and the Library Aid staff (8th grade student editors). For those who don't know, a printing house is where rough drafts of books go to be printed and published. What this means for Holy Family is that any student from 2nd-8th grade can submit a book draft to Dr. Kahn at the Library, and the book will have a chance to be actually printed! Chapter books, comics, classic books. The only books they aren't accepting are Non-fiction books, and graphic novels. If you think writing a book alone sounds terrifying, you can write it with a friend. Whole classes can submit books! Dr. Kahn had already received 5 manuscripts. But while anyone can submit a book, the editors may not be able to print everything they get, so if anyone wants their book printed, try to at least have it finished.

The editors know writing a book is a very daunting task and takes lots of time. Dr. Kahn said, "We do not have a final deadline yet, but the cut-off for final submissions to make it on our shelves by the end of the school year will be very early March."

But even this early in the year, the editors have seen 2 very exceptional books that are well-structured and engaging and the student authors have an excellent tone throughout the book- these are exactly the kinds of books the library is looking for!

Once someone has a submission turned in and knows the book will be printed, it's just a matter of how long it will take to print and edit it. The editor will receive them to fix grammar mistakes, help with tone, the perspective, and possibly take out unnecessary pieces. Overall making it seem smoother and more professional. After they go through editing the books are sent to Daniella Ruiz and Hannah Blair, the graphic designers.

Miracle of the Month: Miracle of Tixtla, Mexico

This 24-25 school year, our theme is Food for the Journey. We will be looking into many Eucharistic Miracles. These miracles prove to us that the Host turns into the Body and Blood of Christ.

This month's Eucharistic Miracle is The Miracle of Tixtla, Mexico. On October 21, 2006, a religious sister distributing communion noticed that a host in her ciborium began to bleed. She immediately noticed the pastor who concealed it and later took it to the Bishop. Then Most Reverend Alejo Zavala Castro convened a Theological Commission of investigation, and in October 2009, he invited Doctor Ricardo Castañón Gómez, to take on the leadership of the program of scientific research whose purpose was in fact that of verifying the said event. The scientific research conducted between October 2009 and October 2012 came to the following conclusions. They presented that the blood had come from the inside of the host. Intact white blood cells, red blood cells and macrophages were found. The tissue was found to be heart muscle called myocardium. The blood corresponds to human blood type AB, similar to the blood found in the Host of Lanciano and in the Holy Shroud of Turin. At the time of testing, DNA remnants were found, but not enough to produce amplified DNA.

This is a true miracle, and the results that the scientists came up with prove that the Host is the Body of Christ. One of the reasons God gives us these miracles is that He wants us to see and prove to us that the Host is truly the Body of Christ.

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
