## **ASHES TO ASHES** Students begin Lent on Ash Wednesday

he Lenten season is officially underway with Mass celebrated on Ash Wednesday, February 21, for St. Dominic Savio Catholic High School and Holy Family Catholic School students, parents, faculty, and staff at St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church, leaving standing-room-only.

The celebrant, Father Kyle Nesrsta from St. William Catholic Church, was assisted by Deacon Mark Fair from St. Vincent de Paul. Following the homily, the ashes were blessed in front of the congregation before they were distributed by clergy, students, and teachers.

In a January letter to the Faithful meant to inspire our Lenten journey, Pope Francis offers Catholics words of wisdom to sustain all during the 40-day walk with Christ. "The Lenten journey of penance and the journey of the Synod alike have as their goal a transfiguration, both personal and ecclesial. A transformation that, in both cases, has its model in the Transfiguration of Jesus and is achieved by the grace of his paschal mystery. So that this transfiguration may become a reality in us this year, I would like to propose two "paths" to follow in order to ascend the mountain together with Jesus



and, with him, to attain the goal," wrote the Holy Father.

He continued, "The first path has to do with the command that God the Father addresses to the disciples on Mount Tabor as they contemplate Jesus transfigured. The voice from the cloud says:





"Listen to him" (Mt 17:5). The first proposal, then, is very clear: we need to listen to Jesus. Lent is a time of grace to the extent that we listen to him as he speaks to us. And how does he speak to us? First, in the word of God, which the Church offers us in the liturgy. May that word not fall on deaf ears; if we cannot always attend Mass, let us study its daily biblical readings, even with the help of the internet. In addition to the Scriptures, the Lord speaks to us through our brothers and sisters, especially in the faces and the stories of those who are in need. Let me say something else, which is quite important for the synodal process: listening to Christ often takes place in listening to our brothers and sisters in the Church. Such mutual listening in some phases is the primary goal, but it remains always indispensable in the method and style of a synodal Church."

The ashes are made from the blessed palms used in the Palm Sunday celebration of the previous year. The ashes are christened with Holy Water and are scented by exposure to incense. While the ashes symbolize penance and contrition, they are also a reminder that God is gracious and merciful to those who call on Him with repentant hearts.

His Divine mercy is of utmost importance during the season of Lent, and the Church calls on us to seek that mercy during the entire Lenten season with reflection, prayer, and penance.





### **Families host NET missionaries during storm**

Regardless of Holy Family Catholic School (HFCS) having a NET Retreat scheduled for our sixth, seventh, and eighth-grade students during Catholic Schools Week, God must have had other plans for the teams and the host families.

The NET Retreat, organized by HFCS Religion teacher Sister Teresa Benedicta, had to be canceled due to the Austin ice storm which shut down our schools for much of Catholic Schools Week. This meant that the NET Ministry Team, comprised of young adults from eight various states, had to hunker down with their hosts: the Dobson, Kreidler, and Higdon families.

The missionaries held an impromptu retreat for the neighbors at the Dobson's home. "Our week was full of board games, video games, movies, praise and worship sessions, and wonderful fellowship," said parent Alexis Dobson. "It was such a blessing to learn and listen to these women who have dedicated a year of their lives to share their love of the Gospel. This was such a special time for us, and a time of refreshment for them as well."

Kevin Kreidler and his family hosted three young men from California, New Hampshire, and Minnesota, and apparently one didn't mind the ice and cold. "Issac, from New Hampshire, wore shorts all week as he found the weather to be, "not that cold," said Kreidler. "This cracked me up. I am from Ohio, but I've become very soft - that week was very cold! The missionaries also gave a miniretreat for a few seventh-grade boys."

The Higdon Family says they made the best of the icy situation and held a small in-home sixth-grade



retreat for about 10 girls. "We made the most of our experience playing games, cooking, baking, playing guitar, and praise and worship. As the weather worsened and school was canceled, we decided to host a mini-retreat for 6th-grade girls. We had about 10 join us in our home," said Mrs. Higdon.

Sister Teresa Benedicta was just as disappointed about the cancellation of the retreat; however, she reminds us all who is in charge of this life and all the opportunities we have been given. "I know the rescheduled retreats—whether they occur in this school year or the next—will be extra special because they will be in God's timing. #### Angels 4 Life joined thousands at the Texas Rally for Life

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wenty-four Holy Family Catholic School (HFCS) students, families, and teachers joined thousands of Texans at the State Capital for the annual Texas Rally for Life on January 28, largely because they say the fight for life is not over.

HFCS Angels 4 Life club advisor and fourth-grade teacher, Mrs. April Morley, was joined by Mrs. Michelle Lillie and Sister Teresa Benedicta, for a local pilgrimage showing support for the laws that Texas has put in place to protect the preborn and support mothers with young children.

One seventh-grade student shared thoughts about the experience saying, "The day started with Mass at St. Louis, celebrated by Bishop Mike Sis of San Angelo," said Maggie H. "I am more convinced than ever that abortion is wrong and violent and should stop happening."

After the Rally, students were able to visit several booths sponsored by various pro-life organizations and hear speeches from pro-life leaders. "It was a powerful day!" said Maggie H.

Angels 4 Life is a pro-life student club at Holy Family. The club was founded in the Spring of 2022 by a group of 8th-grade students who believe that all life matters from "womb to tomb."

This year, the club expanded to include 7th grade as well and there are now 26 members. The club meets after school on the 1st, 3rd & 5th Wednesdays of each month.





### Savio Iron Eagles share love of robotics with Pre-K

Holy Family Pre-K students in Mrs. Pafumi's class were treated to a special visit from the Iron Eagles Robotics Team from St. Dominic Savio who brought two of their most successful creations to perform for the wideeyed learners.

The Iron Eagles team showed the students how the robots were made, and then let them try to make them move using the controls. The students asked very good questions and seemed to be very comfortable around the robots.

Many thanks to the students, Mrs. Sylvia Wood, St. Dominic Savio Technology Department Chair, and Mr. Juan Flores, Savio's Engineering and Robotics Instructor, who took the time to bring their students to Holy Family for this enlightening technology lesson.





## Caring for God's Creation

### Students use creativity, critical thinking in the sciences

his quarter, the 5th and 6th-grade students are working hard and using their critical thinking skills as they delve into the world of the natural sciences.

The 5th grade's critical thinking skills were tested as they were tasked with finding and retrieving hidden water in their surroundings. Students used the engineering model to plan and build devices that could extract hidden water from various sources such as from the air or plants.

As they encountered problems, they were encouraged to investigate those challenges and then redesign, rebuild, or reinvent possible solutions. Even the smallest drop of water was celebrated as students began to see their devices yielding results. This lesson became the introduction to the Meteorology unit.

Currently, our 5th graders are being trained on collecting data for NASA's GLOBE program, an international citizen science program that allows students to participate in data collection and contribute meaningfully to NASA's and our understanding of the global environment. Students are learning how to identify the types of clouds, use longitude and latitude coordinates, and how to collect data from the tools in our weather station, such as the barometer and hygrometer.

Explorations with 6th-grade students began as they took their first foraging lesson in the halfmile wooded trail around Holy Family's play space. Students were given a Holy Family field guide that helped them identify native, nonnative, and invasive plant and bird species on our campus. They then hiked the trails and learned about the plant and bird species in our area. They also began practicing identifying birds by their calls and physical features as well as how to catalog their findings for citizen science research.

This lesson became the introduction to future lessons on environmental sustainability and how



to become good stewards of God's creation. Over the course of several weeks, students explored topics such as climate change, ecotourism, fossil and alternative fuels, aquaponics, and sustainable architecture. They also began to investigate ways in which young people can make a positive difference in our environment. They started by first researching famous youth climate activists and then by taking on their own passion projects such as encouraging composting, picking up trash around campus, or planning activities to raise awareness such as the Trashion Fashion show for Earth Day.

As winter fades, the 6th-grade students are returning to the garden. In conjunction with our geology unit, students learned about the soil composition. They learned how to test the soil for minerals and how to fix lacking minerals in the soil in an environmentally friendly way. After researching and planning what to grow in the garden, students will begin to plant their fruits and vegetables which will become our anchor point for future lessons in botany, the carbon and nitrogen cycle, and much more!

Mrs. Jeanne Lyman, HFCS Fifth - Sixth Grade History Instructor and the director of the One Act Play for the last 13 years, successfully introduced, and engaged the cast and crew so mindfully that each character bought into their roles and developed each one with great enthusiasm.

"I was so excited to perform this play and decided to take it to another level, making it look like a black and white TV show by painting the set, the props, and the actors in greyscale," said Lyman, who purchased the correct make-up and had many volunteer moms to paint the actors.

The premise of the show, which was performed in greyscale, includes Ethel and her married friends who are too busy with bridge clubs and bazaars to sew on buttons and mend rips in clothing. This forces Albert to create the neglected husband's sewing club. The men think they are funny discussing hairstyles and nail color, but the joke backfires, and the ladies come out as the winners.

Students performed one evening show for the general audience on Thursday, February 9, and two additional shows for grade-level classes on Friday, February 10. The cast performed the play for the One Act Play Competition held at St. Michaels Academy on Saturday, February 18. The state competition was held on March 7 with the students



coming in second place.

"A show like this requires an extremely talented cast to keep the energy up and the jokes alive," said Lyman. "We also needed an exceptionally responsible crew to paint the set, props, and the people to work the lights and sound! We've had the perfect group for a wonderful show - I'm so proud of how this group brought this awesome play to life!"

The Private Lives of Ethel and Albert was created by Peg Lynch, who scripted and portrayed Ethel. The series first aired on local Minnesota radio in the early 1940s before a run on NBC and ABC from May 29, 1944, to August 28, 1950.

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## **SILVER ANGELS** Fernando & Beatriz Rey support HFCS, their grandchildren

In taking a closer look at two Holy Family Catholic School Silver Angels, Fernando, and Beatriz Rey, you'd never guess that they have been married for 58 years, have six grandchildren, and as for one of them, developed hundreds of thousands of images of the moon for NASA.



He was later hired by a company in New York that was contracted to photograph and develop 450,000 photographs of the moon, so NASA could effectively explore it.

"It was a very exciting job," said Mr. Rey. "We started with developing 50 rolls of film a day, before

Fernando Rey, along with his wife Bea, who is also the Silver Angels Committee chair, are grandparents of four Holy Family students and one St. Dominic Savio student.

Before retirement, Mr. Rey was a lab technician and photographer in Bogota, Colombia, whose main work in the 1960s was to shoot and develop photographs to be used in making new maps of Bolivia and Colombia.

"It was challenging because we took our photographs from airplanes, then developed 8x8 prints to produce the new maps," said Mr. Rey.

One of the most exciting discoveries by Mr. Rey was uncovering the film process known as solarization. In photography, solarization is the effect of tone reversal observed in cases of extreme overexposure of the photographic film in the camera. Most likely, the effect was first observed in scenery photographs including the sun.

The couple moved to the Austin area to support their grandchildren, which includes providing valuable Silver Angel assistance to the Holy Family Parent's Association and helping with many events for Holy Family Catholic School.
