NATIONAL SPANISH **EXAM**

Every year the eighth grade students compete in the National Spanish Exam against peers from all over the country. The exam consists of

a variety of language acquisition skills such

as grammar, vocabulary, reading and listening comprehension. There were 34 students that received national recognition for excellent performance and all students were awarded Gold, Silver, Bronze or Honor medals. The three gold medalists were Alexander Lacayo, Johnny Miri and Ricardo Santos.

PSIA

DISTRICT. PSIA (Private Schools Interscholastic Association) is a 1st-8th grade student academic competition. It is the equivalent of academic competitions like UIL competitions in public schools. In February, Holy Family competed in the District 6AA PSIA competition with schools from the Central Texas area and as far away as El Paso. Points were awarded for students finishing in the top six places in each event. Holy Family accumulated 872 points, over 300 points more than the second-place winner! We sent 66 students to compete in 137 events and over 45 students placed in 90 of our 137 events. For the seventh year in a row, Holy Family was the district champion in the elementary division!

STATE. Holy Family sent 19 students to compete in 35 events at the state PSIA championship. More than 50,000 students from 250 schools participate in Texas, and over 100 schools were represented at the state competition. We came home with 15 medals and as the **elementary state champions!**

Academic Excellence is one of four core values at Holy Family. Every child is encouraged to develop his or her fullest potential through the academic programs. We offer participation opportunities in various academic competitions and more. Lessons are enriched with unique circumstances that challenge students to strive for excellence.





DIOCESAN SCIENCE FAIR

On April 14, several students participated in the Diocesan Science Fair. Paula Warren received first place in the Physical Sciences category for her project, *Moisturizing Siding*, and Luke Mikosh received second place in the Life Sciences category for his project, *Slowing the Enzymatic Browning of Cut Potatoes*.

SIXTH GRADE SAINT PROJECT

The sixth grade students have the opportunity to research a saint of their choice by reading a biography to make their saint 'come alive' for the student body of the school. The students research and create a costume that would have been worn by their saint, as they step into the character of that saint through their words and actions. The day begins with a monologue to classrooms as the sixth grade students come dressed as their chosen saint. This gave the younger students exposure to learn more about saints like St. Maximilian Kolbe, St. Helen, San Juan Diego and St. Teresa of Calcutta, to name a few!





QUIZ BOWL TEAM

This year, five participants traveled to Chicago for the Middle School National Championship Tournament. Maya Cooper, Jared Lillie, Luke Mikosh, Johnny Miri and Mariana Silveyra competed against 191 other teams for their participation in nationals. They competed head-to-head with public and private schools from across the country in this buzzer-based competition covering topics from science, history, sports and pop culture. After a full day of preliminary rounds of competition, the team finished with a 5-3 record, and qualified for final playoffs. The team finished the tournament tied for 21st place. Individual stats were recorded during the tournament, and All-Star Awards were presented to the top 30 students at the tournament. Johnny Miri received an All-Star Award as the 6th highest ranked student out of 986 students at the tournament this year!

NATIONAL HISTORY BEE

Six students competed at the Regional History Bee against public and private school students from central Texas. The preliminary rounds included two buzzer rounds and one written round of competition with questions from U.S. and world history. Isabella D'Alessandro, Reagan Hutchinson and Jackson Sloma competed in the elementary division. Luke Mikosh competed in the seventh grade division, Alexander Lacayo and Johnny Miri competed in the eighth grade division. The elementary and eighth grade divisions advanced to the final round. Johnny Miri was named the eighth grade regional champion. This was Johnny's fourth straight win as the Regional Champion in his division. All six students have qualified for the National History Bee in Atlanta, Georgia. We wish them well this summer.



SCIENCE BOWL

Earlier this year, Holy Family sent Luke Mikosh and Johnny Miri to a Regional Science Bowl sponsored by the US Department of Energy. Teams from both public and private schools competed at the regional tournament that includes almost 200 Texas counties. The buzzer-based tournament included questions from the earth science, space science, math, life science, physical science and energy categories. We finished the double elimination tournament tied for 13th place with a 4-3 win-loss record.



BEST ROBOTICS

In October, the Iron Angels competed in the Capitol BEST competition against 35 teams at Westwood High School. Most of the teams' present, were high schools and much larger teams than the Iron Angels middle school team. Holy Family concluded the day in 15th place after six rounds in the head-to-head competition. Holy Family was eliminated in the wild-card round by only a few points. This year, the mission of the Robotics Program was to create a hand-made, easy to control, and safe robot. The team wanted to use the robot to not only stop fires but to save firefighters from risking their lives to save others in a dangerous environment. The robot was named St. Florian, because he is the patron saint of firefighters. St. Florian's goal was to stop chemicals that could feed fires from spilling and help bring people out of the danger from quickly approaching fire. The team was a group of ten hardworking boys and girls. The students present at the October competition were Juan Pablo Basualdo, Mary Buckley, Matthew Burkhart, Campbell Harkness, Victoria Holmes, Brian Laster, Seth Magee, Teresa Selvaraj, and Jett Stringham.



DESTINATION IMAGINATION

There were six students in kindergarten through second grade that participated in the Destination Imagination Program. The program encouraged students to work in teams to solve problems and complete STEM-based challenges. The program explored creative thinking, building their own ideas and skills, with no help from anyone outside the team. The team name was Magical Cultures. Sydney Griser, Emily Nash, Sophie Jones, Arabella Jones, Hannah Pillsbury and Daniela Castillion were asked to explore two different cultures and create an environment where they could collaborate. The girls created a show where people from Italy and Australia met at an airport and shared experiences. This year's program was very rewarding for all involved.



HURRICANE HARVEY

It took many hands in our community to collect and assemble all the donations we received for those affected by Hurricane Harvey. All grades were asked to bring supplies and our 8th grade assembled and organized the items to be picked up and taken to coastal areas. The school also partnered with St. John Paul II Catholic School in Houston, and raised over \$5,500 for them during Catholic Schools Week.



CATHOLIC RELIEF SERVICES RICE BOWL PROJECT

The eighth grade Social Justice class sponsored a school-wide service project for Lent. They encouraged the school to participate in the Catholic Relief Services (CRS) Rice Bowl project. This program invited students to encounter our neighbors through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Each student was asked to make sacrifices and donate their earnings to their CRS Rice Bowl bank. The money collected supported CRS global projects such as access to clean water and home-building projects. The students were introduced to a different country each week that CRS serves.

TEXAS RALLY FOR LIFE

On January 27, several students and parents organized and traveled to the Texas State Capitol to join the Texas Rally for Life. This event brings awareness to the greater community about the cause for life and educates those present about ministries and the churches who are dedicating their lives to assist with this cause.

SPREADING CHRISTMAS CHEER

In November, all Faith building students made prayer cards and Christmas cards as part of our Grandparents' Day Service Project to be mailed to a US Army unit, stationed in Germany. The army unit received the cards just before Christmas, and received comfort from our school during the Christmas season. A Holy Family mother is currently deployed in that unit.

AN EYE FOR ART

Holy Family Catholic School recently expanded its art program for all grades. This year, there were two art teachers that implemented separate curriculums based on age group. Mrs. Angela Quinn taught PreK through 5th grade in a rotating, specials class period, and Mrs. Tiffani Paynter continued to teach middle school art as an elective.



With the school expanding, this was the first year that grades, PreK-5th Grade, had an indepth art class curriculum separate from other classes. This opportunity gives students the ability to learn and understand the elements of art with various time periods of art history, artists, and styles, while grasping different art, materials and techniques. "I want the students to recognize artists, styles, and time periods, when they see images in books, on TV, or in a museum," said Mrs. Quinn.

When Mrs. Quinn was in high school, she was encouraged by her own art teacher to pursue her strengths, that aligned with a degree in art education. Mrs. Quinn had never considered becoming a teacher until she discovered she enjoyed art studies. Ms. Paynter on the other hand, attended college to study design, but stumbled on her passion for teaching after she started pursuing her degree. Together, they bring a unique perspective and encourage students to expand their knowledge and creativity in their art classes.

"I always encourage each student to be brave when creating art. It can be hard in middle school, since the students are so worried about what others will think," says middle school art teacher Tiffani Paynter. "I want students to experience as many different (art) mediums as possible, to stretch when learning to draw, and to be proud of their work. Anyone can draw, by simplifying your drawing into basic shapes. I want my students to leave knowing the elements and principles of art, art history and art careers."

This year an Art Technology class was added to the 6th grade elective courses. This class gives students the learning experience to draw, sculpt and paint along with applying the elements of art. The use of computer programs are added to their assignments to assist with learning the fundamentals of artistry on software programs, such as Paint 3D, Google Draw, Photoshop and MyStorybook.com. It is estimated 80% of the class focuses on applying these programs to their projects.

"When creating, I like to compare the project to living life. You have to be patient, you are always a work in progress. You can mess up, creating happy accidents, and this allows your art to be better than what was in your mind," said Mrs. Paynter.


Sophia Miksch*14 is a sophomore at St. Dominic Savio where she plays varsity volleyball and soccer. She received 2D team All-District honors for soccer.
